


What is the project?

In simple language this is a trail project.

The West Oakland Link of the Bay Skyway will provide a safe connection for bicyclists and pedestrians to travel between West Oakland, the Port of Oakland, and the Bay Bridge Trail.

- 1.1 miles of separated, elevated 15' wide low-stress multi-use path
- Connects with the planned Grand Ave bike lane (to downtown) at Mandela/Grand intersection
- Landscaping and community amenities based on community input

Safety, accessibility and environmental exposure are key priorities.

Accommodating multiple modes of transit is critical to accessibility of the space.

Equitable access for and engagement of local residents must be prioritized.

Ongoing maintenance is a fundamental part of keeping the space accessible to all.

Signage and lighting need to be abundant for the path to be usable.











STORY: PULLMAN PORTERS


